WELCOME

The Wesley School is a church exempt Christian school where the whole child is valued, relationships cultivated, and neuro-diversity is recognized and respected. Our classroom communities affirm the dignity of every child, lay a Christian moral foundation of critical and creative thinking, and teach children how to listen, share, and communicate across our differences. Our program emphasizes the importance of individualized learning models, collaborative learning, hands-on lessons, outdoor education and Christian living. Our aim in Christian education is to help children think, judge, and act like Christ. Learning is asking questions, exploring, and assessing knowledge. We hold to the truth that 'The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and knowledge of the Holy One is understanding.' (Proverbs 9:10)

As an outreach ministry of Mt Harmony-Lower Marlboro United Methodist Church, The Wesley School is inspired by our Wesleyan heritage that believes transformative growth results from a classroom community that celebrates the disciplines of Christian life such as worship, daily prayer and Bible study, and service to others. Our intention is we prepare life-long learners, who grow in devotion to Christ and service to the world. (Matthew 24:24-40) with hearts anchored in the hope of Jesus Christ. In the words of Jesus, we pray that "they may be in this world, but not of it." (John 17:15).

WHO WE ARE

The Wesley School - Preschool Program is regulated under **COMAR 13A.17** ("Letter of Compliance") and licensed by Maryland's Office of Child Care. The Preschool Program is located in the educational building at Mt Harmony Church in Owings, MD.

The Wesley School (K-5th) is a church exempt non-public school certified by the Maryland State Department of Education in 2022. Grades 3rd -5th are located in the education building at Centenary United Methodist Church in Shady Side, Maryland. (Anne Arundel County)

Both campuses and all programs follow the same calendar with a five-day-a-week program operating across a 170 day academic year.

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NON-DISCRIMINATION

The Wesley School is committed to providing equal educational opportunities for students without regard to race, color, national or ethnic origin. It does not unlawfully discriminate in the administration of educational policies, admissions policies, scholarship and loan programs or other School administered programs. As a private religious institution, however, The Wesley School reserves the right to discontinue enrollment or deny admission to any applicant whose academic preparation, character or personal conduct is determined to be inconsistent with the purposes and objectives of the School.

THE HANDBOOK

The Parent/Student Handbook contains the rules, regulations, policies, and procedures for The Wesley School. Each year, parents/guardians are required to sign a “Handbook Receipt Acknowledgment Form” to be returned to the school office. At “Meet The Teacher” in August, parents will be given a hard copy of this booklet and an opportunity to sign the Handbook Receipt Acknowledgement Form (which is on the last page of this booklet.) This will be placed in the student record file. Failure to sign or return the “Handbook Receipt Acknowledgment Form” has no effect upon the applicability of this handbook’s provisions.

RIGHT TO AMEND

This Handbook is updated annually and distributed to each incoming and returning student. The Head of School with the approval of The Wesley School Board and church council or other governing body reserves the right to amend this Student/Parent Handbook at any time without advance notice. Parents/Guardians will be given prompt notice of amendments. Those changes will also be made available to the downloadable Parent/Student Handbook that is available online at the school website www.thewesleyschool.com

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OUR CORE VALUES

These phrases help to define our school culture and shape what we do:

“We uphold a Biblical worldview.” We apply the biblical understanding that God is active and sovereign over all areas of our life. Worship and prayer is central to our school community through weekly chapel, daily prayer and celebration of holidays. Upper elementary students engage in study of the Word to understand the overarching story of Creation (how things ought to be), the Fall (what went wrong), and Redemption (how can this be made right through Jesus Christ). In the sermon 'On the Education of Children' John Wesley named that Christian training would help children overcome the sins of “self-worship, pride, deviation from truth, and living contrary to justice.”

“Do All the Good You Can.” As our primary core value, the school motto translates into showing understanding, respect, social responsibility, honesty, and kindness as staff, colleagues, and companions on our learning journey. (Galatians 6:9-10)

“We are all different, and we learn from each other.” We believe in an inclusive school community that supports multiple learning styles and teaches how to communicate across our differences. We model this through our interactions with each other as staff, and in our partnerships with families. Neurodiversity is celebrated as an opportunity to share our skills and talents and learn from one another. We commend our differences as part of God’s design, recognizing each child as made in His image. (Genesis 1:27)

“Life-Long Learners.” We understand that learning is not confined to childhood or the traditional classroom setting, but is a continuous process that takes place across different times and contexts. When academic and life skills are intertwined, we achieve meaningful learning that reflects real life. True wisdom is a lifelong pursuit. 'Let the wise hear and increase in learning.' (Proverbs 1:5)

“Developmentally Appropriate.” We seek to know our children as whole persons and use their emergent ideas and strategies as a basis for developing understanding. We ensure experiences and goals are suited to learning while also challenging enough to promote their progress and interest.

“You can do hard things.” This motivating core value builds a mindset of resilience and encourages the appropriate risk taking that is needed for growth. It compels children to meet challenges, push through self-limiting beliefs and gain confidence. Children and staff grow to become cheerleaders of their own, and each other’s growth. No matter our age, we are capable of more than **we** believe! We encourage resilience, grounded in 'I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.' (Philippians 4:13).

“Leaders are Readers” A love of reading is contagious, and our school culture demonstrates a passion for books. We create comfortable, inviting reading spaces for children, and source books which will interest and inspire them. We offer literacy support at every age level. When we teach children to read, we hand children the keys to discovering new knowledge, and to unlocking their imagination!

“Celebration of Learning.” At The Wesley School we understand the value and importance of taking pause for reflection. We reflect on what we have learned, the ways in which we learned it, the questions we have answered, and what our areas of strength and struggle have been. This is a practice which lays the foundation for children to become the self-reflective adults we all aspire to become, who can set and achieve goals.

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TEACHER CREDENTIALS

Our primary elementary academic teachers hold, at minimum, a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university. All our staff share the philosophical passion for the unique approach of the program. OUR APPROACH

Our small-group classroom makes it possible for us to implement the best models of education to encourage collaborative learning, self-initiated discovery, hands-on lessons, and individualized learning. We seek to create the best learning environment for your child so that they have the ability to concentrate, think critically, express ideas, and communicate respectfully.

By working with the unique learning profile of each student, we can better understand each child's pattern of development to ensure they master the knowledge and improve their grade level skills. Our special educators develop Instructional Service Plans in collaboration with teachers, parents, and any other related service professionals.

GOALS AND PURPOSES OF OUR EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM

Our guiding principles are founded on the biblical understanding that every student is created in the image of God and that learning is a life-long discovery of the knowledge and love of God among all people. Therefore at The Wesley School,

(1) we uphold a biblical-based educational approach that celebrates the diversity of learning styles, valuing each person as a unique child.

(2) we collaborate as a community of support between students, teachers, and families to succeed in each student's academic pursuit.

(3) we encourage the development of life-long learners with an awareness of personal and collective responsibility to care for others and the world.

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HOW WE WILL ACHIEVE THESE GOALS:

Our daily schedule encourages creative and critical thinking, collaborative learning, self-initiated discoveries, and hands-on learning while introducing Christian elements into daily classroom life.

Christian disciplines of prayer, worship, biblical study and service to others round out the educational experience. Along with integration of the arts including music, media, fine arts and performing arts.

Project work and systematic instruction work together through four, interrelated practices:

1. Systematic knowledge and direct skills instruction
2. Activities which employ those skills to solve problems in real-life application
3. Child-led projects which investigate and explore topics deeply, integrating a range of subject areas, and providing opportunities for children to transfer the skills bank they have built up, across their projects
4. Project presentation, and Assessment for Learning.

SCHOOL YEAR

The school year begins the Tuesday after Labor Day each September and fulfills the MSDE requirement of 170 instructional days per academic year. The school calendar is established in January each year for the following year. The calendar is online at <https://www.thewesleyschool.com/calendar>

DAILY SCHEDULE AND LOCATIONS

Preschool classes are held Monday - Friday. (5 day a week program)

AM CLASS: 8:30am - 12:30pm (4hrs-students eat lunch at school) Typically consisting of 4yr olds

PM CLASS: 12:30pm - 3:30pm (3hrs) Typically consisting of 3yr olds

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CLASSES: Grades K-5th are held Monday - Friday: 9am - 3pm.

Lower School: Grades K-2nd

Upper School: Grades 3rd-5th

The Lower School meets in the education building at Mt Harmony United Methodist Church: 155 E. Mt Harmony Road Owings, MD 20736.

The Upper School meets in the education building at Centenary United Methodist Church: 6248 Shady Side Road Shady Side, MD 20764. All schools use the same phone number 410-257-0642. You may text or call this line.

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OUR CURRICULUM

Our curriculum areas align with the licensing regulations for our Elementary and Preschool programs. Elementary instruction is across the areas of Literacy, Math, Social Studies, and Science and aligns with standards set by Maryland State Department of Education. Resource areas such as art, religion, music, performing arts, multi-media and physical education are taught by resource teachers in each area of focus.

CURRICULUM: PRE-K

Knowing the importance of early childhood education we value learning through play! We use developmentally appropriate teaching practices introducing academics such as letters, sounds, numbers, and counting in order to prepare them for Kindergarten. We help to develop social emotional skills which are vital in the development of the whole child. We connect to thematic units throughout the year and integrate multi sensory learning.

CURRICULUM: GRADES K- 2ND

First and foremost, the curriculum used at Wesley School for early elementary education has been vetted and approved by the Maryland State Board of Education and aligns with Maryland state standards. We follow their guidelines for our curriculum in the core areas of literacy, mathematics, social studies, and science. The curriculum map available on our website serves as a summary of topics and standards taught throughout the school year.

CURRICULUM: GRADES 3RD - 5TH

For grades 3rd-5th, we draw from several Christian resources in order to meet the scope of learning for each grade level in accordance with Maryland state standards. Learning resources from *The Good and the Beautiful* as well as academically rigorous textbooks from *Purposeful Design Publications* and *Modos Press* are our sources for teaching from a biblical worldview.

SCREEN TIME POLICY

There are no screens such as tablets, computers, televisions in the preschool and early elementary classrooms. In the event that teachers determine students will watch a movie for a special event or as part of an educational supplement we will inform parents in advance. Students in The Upper School WILL access computers and tablets for supervised research and multimedia arts as well as typing skills programs.

CLASS RATIOS

Our classroom ratios are as follows: (1:8) preschool (1:12) Kindergarten - Fifth grade. These ratios enable us to utilize small group and individualized learning models. Teaching assistants, special educators, and resource teachers are not included in this ratio.

TUITION AND FEES

A Tuition Agreement Form is completed annually showing the amount of a family's tuition obligation. Payments can be made monthly by check, cash, or credit card (credit card fees will apply). Note the start date for year round (12 month), full and half payments begin in August whereas the 10-month option runs September through June. For newly enrolled students, a non-refundable deposit is due upon acceptance of agreement. Once a Tuition Agreement is signed, this obligates the fulfillment in payment of the tuition amount in the event of unenrollment at any time. Please see the included WITHDRAWAL POLICY AND LATE TUITION PAYMENT POLICY in the event tuition isn't paid on time. If additional fees such as before/after care, transportation, or field trip fees are not paid on time, it may result in your child not being able to participate in these activities.

Preschool Tuition

Morning Session 8:30am - 12:30pm: \$5,000 per school year

Afternoon Session 12:30pm - 3:30pm: \$4,250 per school year

Includes resource materials, daily snack and 1 uniform school shirt. Not Included: Additional Field Trip Fees, Additional School Shirts, After School Clubs, before and after care.

Kindergarten -5th Grade

\$10,000 for Academic School Year 9:00am - 3:00pm

Includes resource materials, supplies and 1 uniform school shirt for new students only. Not Included: Daily Lunch, Additional Field Trip/bus Fees, Additional School Shirts, After School Clubs, Transportation between campuses, before and after care.

SIBLING DISCOUNT

All families who have more than one child enrolled will qualify for a sibling discount of 10% off the youngest child's tuition.

PAY IN FULL DISCOUNT

Because of our commitment to keep the cost of tuition low, we are not able to offer a discount for families who pay in full.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships are reviewed and awarded on a rolling basis, it is best to apply early.

Upon application, please note if you are eligible for scholarship based on any of the following:

- (1) Returning students (enrolled in Wesley School as a Kindergartener in 2019-20).
- (2) Parents hold church membership at Mt Harmony-Lower Marlboro United Methodist Church or Centenary United Methodist Church.
- (3) Multiple children attending enrolled in The Wesley School

RETURNING STUDENTS

All current students will automatically be registered for the next academic year. If you do not wish to return, notify the Head of School by February 1. All families will receive the Tuition Agreement in January to be signed and returned by February 1.

Early and Late Withdrawal Policy

Purpose

As a Christian school, we value commitment, integrity, and stewardship. When families enroll, the school makes financial and staffing commitments for the full academic year. This policy outlines the tuition obligations associated with early withdrawal or late withdrawal after a signed Tuition Agreement has been submitted. Before a Tuition Agreement is signed a student's spot is able to be held with a \$250 non-refundable deposit for Pre-School and a \$500 non-refundable deposit for elementary school.

Tuition Agreement:

A binding agreement between the parent/guardian and the Wesley School for one academic year.

Early Withdrawal:

Withdrawal occurring **after signing the Tuition Agreement but before the first day of school.**

Late Withdrawal:

Withdrawal occurring **on or after the first day of school**, regardless of attendance.

Early Withdrawal (Before First Day of School)

Once the Tuition Agreement is signed, the school immediately reserves a seat for the student and commits resources in anticipation of enrollment. Because of this commitment, the following tuition percentages apply:

- **Withdrawal within 15 days of signing the contract:**
25% of annual tuition due.
- **Withdrawal more than 15 days after signing but before June 1:**
50% of annual tuition due.
- **Withdrawal on or after June 1-July 31:**
75% of annual tuition due.
- **Withdrawal after July 31:**
100% of annual tuition due.

These fees help ensure financial stability and responsible stewardship of school resources.

Late Withdrawal (After First Day of School)

Once the academic year begins, full staffing and operational commitments are in effect. For this reason:

- **Withdrawal after the school year begins:**
100% of annual tuition due

Tuition is **not prorated**, and no refunds are issued for early departure unless a qualifying exception applies.

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Non-Refundable Fees

The following payments are **non-refundable** under any circumstance, including withdrawal:

- Application fees
- Enrollment/registration fees
- Curriculum or material fees paid prior to withdrawal
- Technology or activity fees already incurred

Exceptions

The school may consider tuition relief or adjustment in **rare and exceptional circumstances**, such as:

- Forced Military reassignment

All exceptions are reviewed by The Wesley School board for approval. Approval is not guaranteed.

Acknowledgment

By signing the Tuition Agreement, parents/guardians acknowledge they have read, understood, and agreed to the Early and Late Withdrawal Policy.

STUDENT TRANSFERS

Requests for student transfers must be completed by the parent or legal guardian of the student.

Incoming Transfers: Students enrolling in our program from another school will receive a letter from The Wesley School stating that your child has been accepted into our school and we are requesting the release of records. This letter, along with any signed documentation that is needed from your former school, will initiate the transfer of records. Transfer of records is handled between schools.

Outgoing Transfers: When requesting to transfer from The Wesley School, please contact the new school first. The receiving school will initiate the process with us through documentation that your child will be enrolled in their program. Records will not be released to parents or guardians directly.

SICK POLICY

“If sick, stay home.” We encourage staff, teachers and students who are sick to stay home. There will be no awards for perfect attendance as we recognize that such an award could influence safe decision making. Any child with respiratory symptoms (cough, runny nose, or sore throat) accompanied by a fever must be excluded from school and may return after the fever associated with these symptoms has resolved for 24 hours (without the use of fever-reducing medicine). Children with a fever (>100.4) or other signs of illness stay home. If your child has vomited, it is policy for that child to stay at home for 24hrs after the last time they threw up. Employees and students who become ill are encouraged to stay at home without fear of reprisal. If a child or staff member develops a fever during the school day or vomits, they will be asked to be picked up.

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STUDENT DROP-OFF

Preschool AM + PM drop off is handled at the door near the preschool classroom with the Mt. Harmony Pre-K blue awning (west side of building).

Drop off begins at 8:30am for AM and 12:30 pm for PM. Parents or guardians will walk the child to the door, and sign the child in. Parents may NOT have preschool children walk up to the door alone or with another student. The parent or guardian must “hand off” the child to the teacher. Parents or guardians are encouraged NOT to walk inside with their child. If the child is upset the teacher will handle the situation accordingly. Please be on time, as this affects the schedule for the day and the ability for the child to acclimate into the classroom.

Kindergarten - 2nd Student drop off begins at 8:45am. The location of drop off is the office doors on the west side of the building (entrance to Main office and library). This is a rolling drop off. Please pull your car up to the top of the hill in front of the steps/door and let your child out. A teacher/head of school will be there to greet your child. Parents are NOT to enter the classroom with their child. If the child is upset the teacher or Head of School will help to handle the situation accordingly. You will then continue to drive down the hill and exit the parking lot from the lower level.

Third Grade-5th Grade For students being dropped off at the Centenary campus, they may enter the building at 8:45am. Please knock on the main entrance door and a teacher will let the student in. For students using bus transportation to the Upper School, drop off is at the lower level parking lot cafeteria doors BEFORE 8:30am. The bus leaves promptly at 8:30am. Children who miss the bus will need to have their parents make arrangements for transportation to Shady Side. Teachers may not drive students to or from the location without parental permission. DROP off before 8:20 will be considered before care.

In the event that the location or time of pick up or drop off is changed or adapted, or there is an issue with the bus transportation, breakdown or accident, parents will be communicated by alert system or through online communication tools or texting. Please contact the Head of School if you have a transportation concern or question.

STUDENT DISMISSAL

Preschool AM + PM students are to be picked up on the opposite side of the building from drop off. They will be dismissed on the ramp of the upper level parking lot (east side of building beside the mailbox under the Wesley School awning.) Children will wait under the awning and are dismissed one by one to their parents' cars. Children are not to run out toward parents or in between cars. When you greet your child, please accompany them directly to the car.

Kindergarten student pick up is at 3:00pm at the left side upper level parking lot ramp (east side of building beside the mailbox under the Wesley School awning.) Children will wait under the awning and are dismissed one by one to their parents' cars. Children are not to run out toward parents or in between cars. When you greet your child, please accompany them directly to the car.

First - 2nd Graders Student pick up is 3:00pm at the back LOWER level parking lot or cafeteria doors.

Location of pick up for Kindergarten and all PreK classes are subject to change or adapted, but will be communicated by alert system or through online communication tools or texting.

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Upper School 3rd-5th Grades - Upper elementary students may be picked up directly from the Shady Side Campus at 3:00pm from the main entrance. A teacher will dismiss the student to their parent/guardian's vehicle. Students riding bus transportation will be picked up from the Upper School at 3pm and arrive at the Lower School around 3:30pm.

TRANSPORTATION BETWEEN CAMPUSES

For an additional fee, bus transportation is available for those students attending The Upper School. The bus will depart Mt. Harmony, Owings campus at 8:30am from the lower level parking lot and students will return to the lower school location in Owings by 3:30pm. Children will be expected to review and abide by the rules of bus transportation. Any student who is not able to follow these rules will lose bus privileges.

Our transportation company is Mac Transportation of Chesapeake Beach, Maryland. In the event that Mac cannot provide transportation because of a significant event or issue, parents will be promptly notified to make individual arrangements.

BEFORE SCHOOL CARE

For an additional fee, we provide before school care for children who need to arrive before 8:45am. Before care begins at 7:45am. The children are dropped off at the Lower Level parking lot at the main cafeteria doors. Students will check in with the Before Care teacher. The cost is \$10 a day which covers both before and after care or \$50 a week, space is limited. For drop-in occasions we charge \$10. We accept checks made out to The Wesley School or cash.

****If your child is a sibling of an Upper School student, there will be no before care fee charged when dropped off together at 8:30am.**

AFTER SCHOOL CARE

For an additional fee, we offer after school care for children who need to stay until 5pm. Students will go directly to aftercare from dismissal of their classes at 3pm. If your child needs drop-in aftercare, parents must inform the Head of School in person or via text on the school phone (410-257-0642) as well as the child's teacher so that the teacher can direct the child properly and after care staff is notified. The cost is \$10 per day (both before and after included) or \$50 a week, space is limited. For drop-in occasions we charge \$10. We accept checks made out to The Wesley School or cash. **Aftercare ENDS AT 5PM.** In the event you will be late because of an extenuating circumstance you must contact the Aftercare teacher and school phone via text or phone call. In addition please reference the aftercare LATE PICK UP POLICY attached. When picking up your child from aftercare, you must sign your child out and notify the aftercare teacher.

****If your child is a sibling of an Upper School student, there will be no aftercare fee charged while waiting for the bus to arrive at 3:30pm.**

AFTER SCHOOL CLUBS

For an additional cost, we may periodically offer clubs, including; Kids Bible Academy, Spanish or French foreign language, chess, etc, throughout the year. Information will be sent out for families to sign up in advance.

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EMERGENCY SCHOOL CLOSING PROCEDURES

The Wesley School uses a school-wide alert notification system should an emergency issue arise with a need to communicate rapidly. This system will notify you by phone and text. A robo-call from the Head of School **may** be used if necessary to explain the emergency. Notifications like these are not used for communicating regular information, and will only be used to announce unscheduled school cancellations, news of inclement weather delays, or building emergencies such as loss of heat, water pressure or electricity. Please ensure all necessary parents or guardians in the household have provided the school with a contact number. We will also post school closings on our Wesley School Facebook page.

INCLEMENT WEATHER

The Wesley School doesn't necessarily follow the same closings for weather as any of our neighboring county school districts. Our assessment is on a smaller geographical area and depends upon our ability to clear our parking lot and open the building safely. We encourage all families to employ best judgment on your safety to reach school. School closings that accumulate may require an extension of the school calendar, as we require a 170 day academic year. In the event of school closing for inclement weather we may provide a virtual learning day over ZOOM in order to prevent the need for make-up school days. In this instance we encourage all students to sign on ZOOM during their scheduled time for a brief online meeting.

PARENT/GUARDIAN-TEACHER COMMUNICATION

It is very important that you know what your child is discovering in the classroom and that we get to hear your feedback. Our teachers use a communication app called BLOOMZ. Please ensure you are added to your child's class BLOOMZ with the instructions you receive at meet the teacher. You will receive pictures, reminders of special events, and other important information through this application. You are also able to message teachers directly or other parents via the app. Teachers are available for parent/guardian-teacher conversations and conferences at the parents request anytime. Conferences are formally held two times per year, please see the school calendar for these dates. For emergencies, please call or text the school phone. We prefer that your child's teacher not receive texts during instructional hours.

PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

Parental involvement and cooperation with teachers is essential for the success of a child's learning and growth. It is expected that parents and teachers sustain communication attending parent-teacher conferences, as well as conferring regularly with their child's teacher about changes in academic, social and emotional development. Please notify your child's teacher of any big life changes or events that may arise during the school year.

Parents are encouraged to become involved in the PARENT TEACHER ORGANIZATION which assists with fundraisers, special events, and community dinners.

Families are encouraged to grow in their faith together through worshipping together, serving others together and family retreats with the school and church. Service project opportunities are available for families throughout the school year. Parental involvement is essential for student growth. We encourage families to pray regularly for the school community. As Deuteronomy 6:7 reminds us, 'Impress them on your children. Talk

about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up.' Together, school, home, and church disciple our children in Christ.

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PARENTAL CONCERNS

If a family has a question or concern regarding their child or would like to schedule a conference, they should contact the classroom teacher or Head of School promptly. Parents are asked to refrain from

engaging teachers in informal conferences in the classroom, hallway, carpool lane or at special events, as it is unprofessional and does not allow teachers to complete their assigned duties during these times, such as remaining attentive to their students and other responsibilities. When scheduled in advance, teachers are happy to meet with parents before or after school to discuss academic progress, discipline issues, or other matters.

If, in the opinion of the administration, any parent or teacher exhibits behavior that interferes with the teaching/learning process, action may be taken. Interference with the teaching/learning process or the peaceable unity of the school may result in removal of staff members or parents may be asked to withdraw their children from the school. Behavior may include, but is not limited to: communications via emails, blogs, text messages, social media, or website postings, verbal comments reported by other community members whether they occur on school property or after school hours that are disparaging to the school or its members. We will not allow adults in our community (whether teachers or parents of students) to threaten, libel, slander, malign, disparage, bully, harass, or embarrass members of the school community; or cause harm to the school community.

PARENT TEACHER ORGANIZATION

The Parent Teacher Organization promotes events and activities that draw families together as a school community. The PTO focuses on creative involvement of families for community building events and family service projects that promote the spirit of our core value, "Do All The Good You Can." The PTO coordinates the monthly Wednesday Night Wesley Dinners, the Monthly Birthday Lunches for students, the annual Silent Auction and lead targeted fundraisers annually.

Each Fall, the PTO will be open to all who are interested in participating. The initial meeting will include the establishment of a President, Vice-President, Secretary. For details of job descriptions, please contact the Head of School or the current leadership of the PTO. All funds are handled in accordance with the procedures set forth by the The Finance Committee of Mt. Harmony-Lower Marlboro Church and The Wesley School Board.

CONFLICT

Conflict is defined as a disagreement between two students or a group of students. The results of a conflict can often lead to an argument; however, conflicts are a natural, everyday occurrence between children. Through conflict, we assist children so that they will learn to exercise self-control and establish boundaries.

DISCIPLINE POLICY

School is an important place for children to learn both academics and the social skills they will need to be successful in life and live faithfully in community. Our discipline approach seeks to teach kindness, self-control, and respect, always correcting with love and fairness. As Scripture reminds us: 'No discipline

seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it.' (Hebrews 12:11). Developmentally appropriate consequences related to the misbehavior are the most effective approach in addressing concerning behavior.

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Our staff uses “teachable moments” of discipline situations to support changes in behavior and to build problem solving skills. In or out of the classroom unsafe or disrespectful behavior must be immediately addressed. The goal is to use the problem as an opportunity for the misbehaving child to affect positive change at this teachable moment and to provide an appropriate consequence.

Appropriate behavior is defined as following three basic rules:

1. We respect ourselves and others.
2. We respect and care for school and personal property.
3. We observe playground boundaries, lunchroom, library, and school safety rules.

Unsafe or disrespectful behavior must be taken seriously. It is important to remember that there is no one right way to address this type of behavior in that the circumstances, age of child, frequency, complexity, and special needs are all considerations when determining appropriate consequences. At the same time the following guide provides a starting point for determining a suitable strategy to extinguish unwanted behavior, encourage appropriate social conduct, and provide an appropriate consequence.

DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS

When methods of positive reinforcement, motivation, and conferencing with students have not proved successful, or when seriously disruptive conduct has taken place, the student may be suspended or expelled.

INTOLERABLE BEHAVIORS

Aggressive, reckless, harassing or bullying behavior which jeopardizes the health, safety, or welfare of the student, other students, the greater community, or staff members an **Incident of Harm Report** is filed and disciplinary action follows.

Any student involved in fighting, play fighting, hitting, biting or promoting fighting shall prompt the filing of an Incident of Harm Report that could result in disciplinary action. A conference with the parents may be requested, and a student may be suspended, expelled, or the parents may be asked to withdraw their child from the school.

INCIDENT OF HARM

An incident of harm is an occurrence where a student is significantly injured in some way. This doesn't include instances that are of general playing such as a slight scrape, scratch, or bump/bruise. Teachers do all that they can to keep our students safe from accidents and injuries. When a student is significantly injured, the teacher or staff member documents the incident on an **Incident of Harm Report**. This report is shared with parents/guardians of the children injured and the Head of School. The parent/guardian of each child involved in such incidents receives an Incident of Harm Report on the same day via email which should be electronically acknowledged that it was received by the parents/guardian and staff member through a responding email.

When a child has been significantly injured, the parent is also notified by phone promptly and the incident is

documented with the Form. All copies of Incident of Harm Reports should be placed in student files, one copy each in the file of anyone involved. If the Head of School is not on site, the staff member should email,

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text, or call him/her immediately to let them know about the incident.

Incidents of harm resulting from an intolerable behavior of another child can result in immediate suspension or expulsion from school.

Discipline Philosophy

As a Christian school, discipline is rooted in biblical principles of love, accountability, and restoration. Our goal is heart transformation and Christ-like character development. Discipline is handled prayerfully, consistently, and in partnership with parents.

Progressive Discipline Overview

Level 1 – Classroom-Managed Behavior

Examples:

Minor disruptions, talking out of turn, off-task behavior, minor disrespect.

Response:

Verbal correction, reminder of expectations, private redirection. Appropriate consequence by teacher.
If repeated → Parent contact and documentation.

Level 2 – Repeated or Moderate Misconduct

Examples:

Repeated minor behaviors, mild defiance, inappropriate language, minor dishonesty.

Response:

Student conference with teacher, reflection, parent communication if needed, possible loss of privileges.
Appropriate consequences from teacher.
If continued → Administrative referral.

Level 3 – Administrative Referral

Examples:

Ongoing defiance, bullying (first offense) as defined: A bully is a person who habitually uses strength, power, or influence to intimidate, harm, or coerce those they perceive as weaker or vulnerable. Bullying involves repeated, intentional aggressive behavior—physically, verbally, or socially—to cause distress., academic dishonesty, minor physical aggression, threats

Response May Include:

Incident Report, Parent conference, written Behavior Plan, detention, in-school suspension (ISS).
If behavior persists → Suspension.

Level 4 – Serious Misconduct

Examples:

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Fighting, harassment, stealing, vandalism, repeated bullying.

Response May Include:

Immediate removal from class, parent pick-up, out-of-school suspension, re-entry meeting, behavioral probation.

Level 5 – Severe or Ongoing Violations

Examples:

Repeated suspensions, continued aggression, serious moral violations, safety threats.

Response May Include:

Final probation or recommendation for expulsion by school leadership and/or governing board.

Immediate Suspension or Expulsion

The school may bypass progressive steps in cases involving:

- Weapons
- Illegal substances
- Serious assault
- Criminal behavior
- Credible safety threats

Probation

Students placed on probation must demonstrate consistent improvement. Further violations during probation may result in suspension or expulsion.

Parent Partnership

Parents are expected to:

- Support disciplinary decisions
- Attend required conferences
- Partner with staff in addressing concerns

Failure to cooperate may affect enrollment status.

Our Commitment:

We seek restoration whenever possible, combining grace with accountability to guide students toward spiritual maturity and responsible conduct.

EXPULSION OR WITHDRAW

Parents who withdraw a child in the course of the year, or students who are expelled, will be expected to complete payment obligations as per their signed agreement.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

When a student will be absent from school, parents must verify the absence by calling or texting the school office 410-257-0642. If there is no contact from the parents, the school will call for verification. If parents cannot be reached, persons listed on the emergency form will be contacted. Planned absences should be discussed with the teacher in advance in order to work with a plan for the time

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missed from instruction. If a student is absent for 20 days or more in a school year, this may be grounds for retention or refusal of future academic services. This will be handled by the Head of School in consultation with the student's teacher(s) and reported to the family by certified letter. Individual circumstances for the reason for the absences will be taken into consideration.

UNIFORM POLICY FOR ALL STUDENTS

Uniforms remind us that while God has made each child unique, we are all members of one body in Christ. (1 Corinthians 12:12). Clothing reflects modesty, simplicity, and unity in our Christian school community. Children must wear their school uniform daily with closed-toe athletic shoes preferably in white, black, or gray each day. Play sneakers are the best for daily wear as we love the outdoors where we can run and climb. Sweaters and sweatshirts in the school colors (Navy blue, light blue, black) are accepted for layering while in the classroom. Shoes must be closed-toe, no flip-flops, sandals, crocks, Ugg boots etc.. Shoes must be worn with socks.

All children must have rain boots and a light jacket that remain at the school. These do not need to be in the color scheme of the school uniform. Outdoor wear such as coats, hats, etc, do not need to be in the color scheme of the school uniform.

PRE-K:

UNIFORM TOP: Boys and girls may wear uniform polo shirts with or without The Wesley School Logo. Girls may also wear the uniform style polo or skater dresses. Long sleeve shirts may be worn underneath the uniform shirts in school colors of navy, light blue, white, or black without logos or patterns. They may also wear sweatshirts, or sweaters in the school colors as well.

UNIFORM BOTTOM: Boys and girls may wear khaki, navy, or black pants or shorts. Girls may wear leggings as well in the uniform colors. Please ensure there are **NO holes in pants**.

BOYS K-5th

UNIFORM TOP: Each uniform polo shirt must be in the approved colors (NAVY OR LIGHT BLUE) and include the Wesley Logo. Long or short sleeve polos are approved. Shirts are available in cotton or moisture wicking breathable material. Sweaters, or crewneck sweatshirts can be added in winter, but must be WITHOUT graphics or logos in light blue, navy blue, black, or gray. Boys may wear a long sleeved shirt in

blue, black, or white underneath their uniform polo shirt when the weather is cold OR a long sleeve polo uniform shirt with the patch.

UNIFORM BOTTOM: Boys may wear uniform style shorts or pants in Khaki, Black, gray, or Navy Blue. No sweatpants or athletic shorts. No denim. Pants may NOT have holes in them.

SOCKS: Socks must be in a solid color of white or black. Socks may be "no-show", or crew.

SHOES: Shoes must be closed-toe athletic shoes. **NO, cowboy boots, crocks, flip flops, or Ugg boots etc.**

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GIRLS K-2nd

UNIFORM TOP: Girls may wear an approved uniform style dress in colors light blue or navy blue with The Wesley School logo. The Uniform Dress option is available in your choice of polo style dress or skater style and short or long sleeve. A school logo can be added to this option through Wear Your Spirit Warehouse. OR a uniform polo t-shirt or long-sleeved shirt in light blue or navy blue with The Wesley Logo. Girls may wear a long sleeved shirt in blue, black, or white underneath their uniform t-shirt in cold months. Sweaters, cardigans, or crewneck sweatshirts can be added in winter, but must be WITHOUT graphics or logos in light blue, navy blue, white, black, or gray.

UNIFORM BOTTOM:

Girls may pair the uniform polo shirt with pants, skirt, shorts or skorts in Khaki, Black, or Navy Blue. Children's place, Target, and Old Navy have several options for these. Girls in the lower school may wear solid color leggings in navy blue or khaki with the uniform shirt. Pants/leggings may not have holes in them.

Under their dress or skirt they may wear tights, stockings or shorts in light blue, navy blue or black. No denim, no sweatpants or athletic shorts are to be paired with the dress.

SOCKS: Socks must be in a solid color of white, light blue, navy blue or black. Socks may be "no-show", crew or knee high. No stripes or designs unless it is the light blue argyle.

SHOES: Shoes must be closed-toe athletic shoes. NO, cowboy boots, crocs, flip flops, or Ugg boots, etc.

GIRLS 3rd - 5th

UNIFORM TOP: Upper School girls may continue their uniform from the previous years or may elect to adopt the plaid dress or skirt that is available from Land's End, Target, or French Toast.

Our school plaid is "Clear Blue Plaid" and you may select the jumper, skirt, or dress option from these outlets and pair them with a uniform polo shirt in white or navy blue. You do not need a logo on the shirt when paired with the plaid.

UNIFORM BOTTOM: Upper School girls may wear uniform shorts of appropriate length or pants in navy blue, khaki, or black. They may NOT wear leggings as pants. Under their dress or skirt they may wear tights, leggings, or stockings in light blue, navy blue, or black. No denim, no sweatpants or athletic shorts are to be worn under the skirt or dress. Pants, leggings, and tights may not have holes in them.

SOCKS: Socks must be in a solid color of white, light blue, navy blue or black. Socks may be "no-show", crew or knee high. No stripes or designs unless it is the light blue argyle print.

SHOES: Shoes must be closed-toe athletic shoes. NO, cowboy boots, crocs, flip flops, or Ugg boots etc.

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ENFORCEMENT OF UNIFORM POLICY

If students come in without appropriate uniform:

* Parents will be notified by the teacher that the student did not have the appropriate uniform, and they were instructed to take off the article of clothing, or be sure to wear the appropriate clothing the next day. * If it happens again, the teacher will notify the Head of School and they will call the parent to let them know the student will need to be brought a change of clothes that comply with the Uniform policy, Or pick up the student from school.

OUTDOOR RELATED GEAR

"There is no such thing as bad weather, only bad gear!" Weather changes and time out of doors is part of our curriculum. It is essential your child has waterproof footwear (rain boots) in the fall and spring. These remain in the school along with a light coat. In winter, boots with insulated lining in the winter and winter jacket.

BELONGINGS & ITEMS FROM HOME

Extra items such as toys, blankets, board games, cards, trading cards, dolls and sporting equipment are permitted at the discretion of the classroom teacher. The teacher or Head of School may adjust this policy as needed. Parents should not allow children to bring items from home that are valuable or cannot be shared with other students. Lunch boxes and water bottles will be transported to and from school daily. Rain boots and extra coat or weather related clothing will remain at school (see uniform policy)

CELL PHONE AND ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Students are **NOT** permitted to bring cell phones, tablets, iPods or any electronic devices including electronic games to school. If there is a legitimate reason to make a phone call home, students will be assisted by a faculty or staff member to call parents. Devices that are found will be held by the Head of School until returned to the parent at the end of day. This includes students that ride the bus to the Upper School. If it is reported that a student has an electronic device on the bus, it will be confiscated by the teacher upon arrival at school. Parents will be notified and repeat offenses may result in bus riding privileges to be removed.

BIRTHDAYS

On birthdays, we pause to thank God for the gift of life and speak a blessing over each child. 'For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made.' (Psalm 139:13-14).

On the first Friday of each month, The PTO will coordinate a Birthday recognition during lunchtime. We will sing and celebrate all those who have birthdays that month. A sign-up genius will be sent out monthly to encourage parents to sign-up and bring in food items or pizza money for the Birthday lunch. In class, on the day of your child's birthday, your teacher may recognize the birthday as a class. Contact your teacher on how she recognizes birthdays. If you would like to send in a celebration item with your child to pass out to the class it is recommended that it be a non-food item. If you are passing out birthday party invitations AT school, it is imperative that all students in that class are invited.

CLOSING NOTE

This handbook reflects our commitment to Christ-centered education. We pray our students grow in wisdom,

stature, and in favor with God and people (Luke 2:52). May every child leave The Wesley School prepared to serve Christ and the world with courage and joy.
